The seminar will be chaired by **Irene Kingston**, Head of Public Affairs at the Equality Commission for Northern Ireland.

The keynote speaker will be **Susan Langford**, Director of Magic Me, an intergenerational arts charity in London. Susan is a visual artist and designer, who founded Magic Me in 1989. She works with groups of young and older people on creative projects. She will present a mix of interactive work and information on a range of projects in different settings, and outline the process of setting up a project.

**Clare McKeown**, Homefirst Trust Health Promotion Service, and **Lucinda McFall**, Larne Community Care Centre, will discuss the practicalities of establishing a community-based intergenerational project in Antiville, Larne.

**Michael Rodgers**, Intergenerational Fieldworker, The Laurel Educational Guidance Centre, Derry, and **Eddie Kerr**, Director, Art Works, Derry, will discuss Millennium Friends: Narrative into Film.

**Carol McCabe**, Age Legislation Team, Office of the First Minister and Deputy First Minister, will discuss an intergenerational consultation exercise.

**Alan Hatton-Yeo**, Director of the Beth Johnson Foundation, and Director of the UK Centre for Intergenerational Practice, will focus on evaluation tools for this work.
